

2018 Reformation Tour

Next July, the Sanctuary Choir will embark on a "Reformation Tour" of Berlin, Wittenberg, Leipzig, Dresden, and Prague. We will leave Nashville on July 2 and return on July 12. The trip will feature walking tours of each city, highlighting key sites associated with the Reformation along the way, including the Castle Church in Wittenberg, as well as Martin Luther's home and the university at which he taught. Other destinations include the Brandenburg Gate and the Holocaust Museum in Berlin, St. Thomas Church and St. Nicholas Church in Leipzig, and St. Vitus Cathedral and the Old Royal Castle in Prague. In addition to all of this, the choir will sing in several churches. Registration is not restricted to choir members and is open to anyone who would like to go. More details, including the cost of the trip, are forthcoming, but mark your calendars now for what promises to be an unforgettable journey!


12:20 Concert on February 25

NB: How long have you been singing?

Judy: I actually never sang in a school or church choir until I was 24 years old! I began playing the piano for the Jr. Choir, in my hometown Baptist church, when I was 12 years old and later became the accompanist for the Youth Choir throughout all my high school years. I have been accompanying or singing in the church choirs since that time. In 50 years of marriage, we have moved 23 times and been members of 13 church choirs!

Jaylon: Growing up in a small town in Texas, I only sang in the shower. Our hometown did not have a school choir, so theoretically I was an athlete. Turns out that was not one of my gifts, so after college I joined the choir at our church in Abilene, Texas. Judy was the church pianist, so I really had no choice. I've sung in church choirs since that time in 1968 and have loved every minute.

NB: What brought you to singing and who has influenced you?

Judy: My dad was a professional drummer up until the time he married my mom. Because he was a trained musician and loved music, there were always records being played on the phonograph in our home. Learning to play the piano added to my love of music. I loved to sing and play "the old hymns," the "new rock and roll" songs and anything in between. Our hometown church choral director was also a big musical influence on me as a child. S.L. Tate (We weren't sure what S.L. stood for, so Jaylon nick-named him "Song Leader Tate") worked at our church during my childhood and my teen years. He was a very talented musician and a wonderful human being.

Jaylon: Without question, my wife Judy brought me to singing and by far has been the most influential person in my life regarding music. She brought me "kicking and screaming" to the choir loft almost fifty years ago and now I can't imagine not being a part of a choir. Three of our closest friends were church choir directors, and we sang in their choirs. Judy and I are Godparents to all of their children. They all had a profound and lasting musical influence on me, and I am eternally grateful.


NB: What is your favorite anthem? Your favorite hymn?


Judy: Like millions of other people, my favorite major anthem is Handel's *Messiah*. Although I have sung it many times, it is still so beautiful that I cry by the time we get to the end. My favorite hymn is "Amazing Grace." My favorite soloist to sing it is my daughter, J'Nae. She sings a fabulous *a cappella* version.

Jaylon: One of my favorites is "My Eternal King" by Jane Marshall. I especially like the dynamics and the message, and it has many of my favorite bass notes! "To God Be the Glory" is one of

my favorite hymns. It's majestic and uplifting, and the text provides words to live by. It makes me smile, and I feel joyful when I sing it.

NB: What is your most memorable experience of singing in the church choir?





Jaylon: In the spring of 2009, I had a heart attack that required immediate hospitalization, placement of a stent and a period of recuperation at home. My first "outing" weeks later came on Good Friday of that year when Judy and I came to the Tenebrae service. As you know, at that service, the sanctuary is dimly lit, and the choir sits quietly in the lighted balcony. A few minutes before the service began, we entered the sanctuary and took our seats midway down on the bottom floor. I turned to look up at the choir and because of the lighting, all I could see were silhouettes of all my fellow choir members. Almost all of them were waving ever so slightly. That moment brought tears to my eyes as I realized how much those choir members meant to me. It is a moment and a feeling I will never forget.

NB: How does singing relate to your spiritual life?

Judy: Attending church, Bible study, singing and sharing my gifts are critical to my spiritual life. To be honest, Jaylon and I visited five Presbyterian churches when we moved to Nashville and chose First Presbyterian Church because of the choir! Music is such an important part of all aspects of my life. I am so very grateful to be a part of this loving, giving, talented and fun-loving group!

Jaylon: I believe music is the universal language that communicates something to all who hear and certainly to all who sing or play. A few years ago, Judy and I were fortunate to go to Cuba with some members of the First Presbyterian Church Choir. Multiple times during that trip, we sang with the Cuban people who did not speak English, but it was clear we all were singing about the same God and shared the same love and joy that comes through music. That connection and that spirit is just one of the reasons I love to sing, especially in this choir!
